IT'S TIME TO SHARE YOUR STORIES

The new Labor Government are looking into how the Intervention and the Stronger Futures Legislation affected Indigenous people so they have formed a Senate Inquiry to investigate this called the Community Safety, Support Service and Job Opportunities Senate Inquiry.

The Senate Inquiry into Community Safety, Support Service and Job Opportunities is your chance to tell your story and the stories of your family and communities to government and share with them how you have been impacted by the Intervention and the finishing up of the Stronger Futures legislation.

The senate are very interested to learn directly from Aboriginal people in the Northern Territory what the effects to community safety, support services, job opportunities, housing and health have been experienced during the intervention and up until now.

Representatives of the Senate Inquiry Committee including co-chair Senator Patrick Dodson will be coming to **Maningrida on the 8th of December** to meet with community directly and hear from individuals and organisations across the West Arnhem region who wish to tell their story.

What's this all about?

In 2007 the Commonwealth Government imposed a package of legislation most commonly known as the Intervention on Indigenous people living in the Northern Territory. A range of restrictions for Indigenous people only were brought in under the Intervention some of these were:

- Closing down Community Development Employment Projects (CDEP)
- Removing customary law and cultural practise considerations from bail

applications and sentencing in criminal trials

- Increasing Policing in community
- Restricting the sale, and drinking of alcohol in prescribed areas
- Abolishing the permit system under the Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1976 for common areas, road corridors and airstrips for prescribed communities

Many will remember the Government sending the army into Indigenous communities around the Territory and then in 2008 they forced change to using a BasicsCard card and introduction of even bigger fines relating to alcohol.

In 2012, five years after the Intervention began, the legislation upon which it was based was due to expire so the Government under Julia Gillard decided to replace it with The Stronger Futures in the Northern Territory Act.

In his inspirational, highly acclaimed memoir – and including reflections from First Nations Elders and young people – Archie Roach tells the story of his life and his music.



NEW AND OLD MAPS OF WESTERN ARNHEM LAND

In 1922 the surveyor H.H. Kirkpatrick was asked to draw by hand a large map of the Oenpelli Aboriginal Reserve and surrounding areas.

If you can make it, come along to Jabiru public library at 5pm on Thursday, 17th November and take a look at copies of both these incredible maps.

You can hear some local elders talk about places whose names are written on the old or new maps. For example, on the old map underneath "Oenpelli H.S." (H.S. stands for "homestead"), you can see the name "Umblanyon" written. Where did that name come from?

Both maps are now available for the public to view at any time.


In Gunbalanya (Kunbarlanja) you will be able to see them at the Demed office.

PROTECT YOURSELF AGAINST JAPANESE ENCEPHALITIS

HELP KEEP OUR MOB FROM GETTING REALLY SICK FROM VIRUSES LIKE JEV

Protect yourself against serious mosquito-borne diseases like Japanese Encephalitis Virus, or JEV, which could be in your area.

Follow these five simple tips to avoid mozzie bites and stay safe.

- Screens should be closed and fixed in all living areas.
- Wear clothes that keep you covered when mosquitoes are biting.
- Apply an effective mosquito repellent regularly.
- Tip out any dirty water where mosquitos can breed.
- Limit outdoor activity at dusk or dawn when mosquitos are about.

Japanese encephalitis (JE) is caused by the Japanese encephalitis virus. Encephalitis is inflammation of the brain tissue and is usually caused by an infection. The virus is spread through mosquito bites. Infection in humans is most commonly asymptomatic. On rare occasions, it can result in severe disease with brain damage and even death.

How it is spread

JE is spread by the bite of an infected mosquito. It cannot be spread from person

to person.

In countries or regions where the virus is present, the transmission is more common in areas of increased mosquito activity.

Pigs and wild water birds help spread the virus. It multiplies in infected pigs, leading to very high levels in their blood. Mosquitoes feeding on infected pigs and water birds pick up the virus and may spread it to humans.

Symptoms

It usually takes 5 to 15 days between getting bitten by the infected mosquito and becoming unwell.

Symptoms include:

- headaches
- fever
- seizures or fits (especially in young children)
- neck stiffness
- drowsiness
- confusion, delirium and coma in severe cases.

Treatment

There are no specific treatments for JE. In most cases, individuals are admitted to hospital where they are closely observed and given supportive care.

How to protect yourself

There are 2 ways to prevent JE:

- avoid being bitten by mosquitoes
- vaccination



Japanese encephalitis disease spread pathway



Japanese encephalitis

- Japanese encephalitis (JE) is a potentially fatal disease caused by the Japanese encephalitis virus (JEV).
- The virus is spread by the bite of an infected mosquito. It cannot be spread from person to person.
- Pigs and water birds play an important role in the spread of the virus. The JEV multiplies in infected pigs and water birds, leading to very high levels of the virus in their blood.
- Mosquitoes feeding on infected pigs/water birds are highly likely to pick up the JEV and may then spread it to humans.

This effectively extended the intervention for a further 10 years.

The new government want to hear about and understand the good and bad news about how all of this impacted Indigenous people in your community.

One example might be telling government how well was your community consulted about grog laws changing this year and whether the people of your community know if they can or can't drink grog in the community now?

Another example might be telling government about the quality and standard of housing in community, homelands and outstations. You are encouraged to tell the story of your families living conditions such as whether your house is overcrowded, what is not working in the house like plumbing, kitchen.

How long you have to wait for repairs and maintenance? Do you have a flush toilet or drop toilet?

How can I tell my story?

Some representatives of the government who are on the senate committee are coming

to Maningrida on the 8th of December to hear directly from community the stories you wish to share.

5 DIMENSIONS OF RECONCILIATION

Reconciliation Australia's vision of reconciliation is based and measured on five dimensions: historical acceptance; race relations; equality and equity; institutional integrity and unity.

These five dimensions do not exist in isolation, but are interrelated. Reconciliation cannot be seen as a single issue or agenda; the contemporary definition of reconciliation must weave all of these threads together. For example, greater historical acceptance of the wrongs done to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples can lead to improved race relations, which in turn leads to greater equality and equity.

JABIRU COMMUNITY HALLOWEEN DISCO



It was a 'Thriller Night' in Jabiru with the annual Halloween Disco held on all hallow's' eve!


