West Arnhem Regional Council's Youth Sport and Recreation staff has been training every Wednesday with Stars and Clontarf Academy in the lead up to a basketball competition in late March.

The West Arnhem community of Gunbalanya is a hive of building activity with the Territory Labor Government delivering ten new homes, and great progress being made on a new 24-lot subdivision. Residents of Gunbalanya have seen positive changes to their community, with upskilling, employment and new homes as part of the \$30 million invested for the construction and improvements of housing employment and upskilling for local labourers.

Works are being carried out through a joint Aboriginal Business Enterprise venture by the Gunbalanya-based Demed Aboriginal Corporation and Indigenous-Darwin-based, owned construction company Australia Dice (DDIV). Since coming to Government in 2016, the Territory Labor Government has built 38 new homes in Gunbalanya with a further 17 homes currently under construction.

additional 12 new homes are also planned for Gunbalanya. More than 60 homes in the community have been upgraded, and builders are working on the extension and upgrade of 40 homes as part of the innovative Room to Breathe program. This means over 60 families in Gunbalanya are living healthier lives, combating stress, overcrowding, associated and disease. Gunbalanya residents will have the homes as they want, with colours, house designs, and orientations are all part of local decision making with the community. Works are delivered under the \$2.2 billion remote housing investment package jointly funded by the Northern Territory and Commonwealth Governments to provide more housing and employment Northern Territory across remote communities. The Territory Labor

Government investing in a new health facility in Gunbalanya, with the tender to be released the coming weeks. Minister for Remote Housing and Homelands, Selena Uibo said, "Jobs and housing are key priorities for the Territory Labor Government, with the halfway mark of housing in Gunbalanya as an important achievement in the delivery of homes across the Northern Territory. Territory Government's remote housing program is changing the housing and social landscape in remote communities across the NT, with Gunbalanya a great example of this positive change. That's why we have made such a big investment addition in replacement homes, renovations extensions, and refurbishments.


This story of Charlie Flannigan – the first man to be executed in the Northern Territory of South Australia.

A Little Bit of Justice - The Drawings of Charlie Flannigan features the story of an Aboriginal stockman who was incarcerated at Darwin's Fannie Bay Gaol between 1892 and 1893.

The exhibition features 22 of his drawings depicting scenes from his days droving on pastoral properties, the local architecture and narrate the story of his transportation to the gaol, all carried out whilst in solitary confinement.

These drawings document the workings of Flannigan's incredible mind, as whimsical in its play as it was photographic in its recollection.

Australians are indebted to Christophersen for his unwavering effort in expanding this curated research into a comprehensive written resource. Complete with



newspaper articles, photographs, journal entries, reproductions of Flannigan's drawings and more, this book endows a legacy to its subject previously uncaptured by the official records.

"Better homes mean better outcomes health, for psychological wellbeing, education and employment as well as improved living conditions and social status." Federal Minister for Indigenous Australians, Linda Burney said, "The Australian and Northern Territory governments are proud to deliver dozens of new homes for families in Gunbalanya. Our remote housing strategy is as much about job creation, training and skills development as it is about providing

healthy safe, homes." "Delivering 17 new homes, and preparing the 24-lot subdivision to begin works in the drier months to come will ease overcrowding Gunbalanya. in "It has also provided community employment opportunities as construction continues." Arafura, Member for Manuel Brown said, "The Gunbalanya community has welcomed Territory Labor

Government's housing investment as they have been highly involved in the planning, design and construction works. This has been a job-creating and upskilling project which has offered number of certified training opportunities for locals of the community. "Nearly half the homes have been completed, which means dozens of families now have safe, healthy homes. I have heard that this has made such a difference for families to have their own home."



COMMUNITY CARE UPSKILLING IN THE KITCHEN

West Arnhem Regional Council staff at the Gunbalanya Community Care have been extremely busy!

Not only are they providing a service, but the team are also undertaking LLN Training with CDU, Certificate III in Individual Support with Response Employment and Training and doing Cooking classes with Ula Williams from Sunrise to Sunset.

The Cooking classes, which

are funded by Stronger Communities For Children Adjumarllarl for WARC staff and community members, will run over a 20-week program.


Ula is very passionate in cooking and happy in working closely with local bining people in showing them better ways on how to prepare and cook healthy meals for their families. The main focus on this program is to train up mob and have them working throughout the community in our kitchens (located at WARC, Adjumarllarl shop and school canteen).

Cooking classes are operating out of the Community Care centre 3 times a week 4:00pm – 7:00pm. Thanks to Ralph McCoy – a/Wellbeing Service Coordinator who is overseeing this program.









Don't get MELIOIDOSIS

Melioidosis is a serious disease caused by germs in our soil that surface after heavy rains. These germs enter your body through cuts and sores or you can breathe them in.

Your risk is greater if you have diabetes, kidney disease, drink too much alcohol, or have a weakened immune system.

Protect yourself from melioidosis

- Wear shoes during the wet season
- Wear gloves when working outside
- Wear a mask when using a high pressure hose
- Stay indoors during storms
- Take it easy with alcohol

of the progress made towards gender equality and highlights the work that still needs to be done.



PROTECT YOURSELF AGAINST MELIOIDOS

A reminder to be on high alert for melioidosis as the wet season conditions continue.

Health professionals in the NT are on high alert at this time of year to identify possible melioidosis cases, as it is important treatment is started as soon as possible.

If left untreated, melioidosis can lead to severe pneumonia and blood poisoning, with around 10 per cent of infections leading to death.

Melioidosis most often causes lung infections presenting with fever, cough and shortness of breath but can also affect many variable parts of the body causing abscesses. Skin sores that don't heal can be caused by melioidosis bacteria.

Melioidosis is a disease caused by the bacterium, Burkholderia pseudomallei, found tropical soil and water. While melioidosis bacteria live deep in the soil at the start of the wet season, heavy rain brings the bacteria in the soil and water to the surface. Wind can cause the bacteria to be blown into the air, which can then be inhaled through dust and droplets.

Melioidosis bacteria soil and surface water most commonly enter the body through cuts and sores so it is important to protect your skin. Most people have their first symptoms of melioidosis one to 21 days after they are exposed and infected with the bacteria.

Take precautions against melioidosis:

·wear covered waterproof footwear when outdoors

·wear gloves while working in the garden or a soil-based environment

·wash then cover sores and abrasions with waterproof dressings

·wear a face mask while using high pressure hoses around soil and paths

stay indoors during heavy wind and rain

·seek medical attention early.

Everyone and especially those with high risk factors need to be aware of these precautions and take actions to protect themselves from melioidosis.

Anyone concerned about having melioidosis symptoms should visit their local GP, clinic or hospital.



5 DIMENSIONS OF RECONCILIATION

These five dimensions do not exist in isolation, but are interrelated. 












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
